





My experience of the Holy Land:

I was privileged to lead a pilgrimage to the Holy Land after Easter this year.

Our route was meant to follow the footsteps of Moses in the Old Testament and of Jesus in the New Testament. We began in Jordan with the journey toward the Promised Land of the Israelites, then we crossed the Jordanian – Israeli border into Israel to continue the journey of Jesus. We visited about 45 holy places within 12 days. People kept saying: “Wonderful experience!” But I would make a note here: In my experience, a pilgrimage is better than a sightseeing tour because it creates a prayerful setting for us to live the experience. I personally recommend such a pilgrimage to everyone who can make it. Let me briefly tell you why.

First, our pilgrimage was very **beneficial**. People often said: “I can’t believe I am here.” It was truly AMAZING to kiss the manger place where Jesus was born, to walk on the same roads He walked in Nazareth where He grew up, to stand on the same spot where He stood in a synagogue to proclaim the fulfillment of the prophecy of Isaiah, to walk along the Sea of Galilee where He called his first disciples, to visit the so-called “Jesus’ town” of Capernaum where He spent a lot of time preaching, to dance on a boat crossing the Sea of Galilee where Jesus walked on water and calmed the storm, to drink very fresh water from Jacob’s well (5,000 years old) where Jesus met the Samaritan woman, to pray in the Garden of Gethsemane where He sweated blood, to walk through the same street of Via Dolorosa where He carried the Cross, to contemplate Calvary hill where his love went all the way, to kiss the rock on which they laid his body for anointing after taking it from the Cross, to enter the tomb where his body was buried, to affirm our own belief in the resurrection, to stand on the ground from which He ascended, etc. This experience is much more profound than watching a movie or hearing a story about Jesus. It is simply beyond words. Of course, our hearing the stories of the Bible is much more alive after such a trip.

Second, our pilgrimage is actually a **ministry**, even an urgent ministry. According to Mr. Khalil, our local tour guide, who is a Catholic Arab, the

population of Christians in the Holy Land has been dramatically decreasing: “The percentage of Christians in the population of the Palestinian territories has halved since the year two thousand, from 2% to 1% over the last 13 years. And in Jerusalem, where in 1948, 27,000 Christians lived, today the baptized are about 5 thousand” (www.news.va). The Catholic population is about half of the Christian population. Christians have been pressured from every side - politically, religiously, economically, socially, etc. I was amazed to see how brave our Christian brothers and sisters were when they chose to stay in that land. It is a tremendous sacrifice for them to remain there. With their level of education and skill, they could easily move to another country to have a better life. Actually I knew some people who had had a safe and comfortable life in another country like Canada, but they chose to go back to live in the Holy Land so they could help keep the Christian holy places alive. But younger generations could think and feel differently about this brave act and move away if they face challenges without being supported from the Christian world, particularly through the channel of pilgrims. I could feel how appreciative they were of pilgrims when I talked to them. They were almost in tears to see that we cared about and valued their sacrifice. In a sense, we Christians in the world owe them a lot for our faith heritage. If those brothers and sisters chose to move away from the Holy Land to seek for a better life, all the holy places of Jesus would be turned into mosques, markets, shops, and other things. Our children would have no more chance to access them as now and as holy places to pray freely. It is Christian pilgrims that make their life possible, and it is their choice to stay that makes our historical-spiritual heritage connected with Jesus possible. So pilgrims going there is not simply for a spiritual tour, but rather a urgent ministry that needs constant support.

Third, this pilgrimage was an **eye-opening experience**. We realized that what we often heard from the media was not necessarily the whole truth. What the media told us could be misleading because they told us what served their interest best. Before going to the Holy Land, for example, some people seemed to

have a negative and somewhat scary understanding about “the other side”, the term coined by the media. But after meeting them, our group had a different image. Let me give an example: When we were in Jordan, one day the people in our group needed to use the restrooms, but we were on the highway far from any public place where we could find any. The tour guide, who was a Muslim happened to remember someone he met only once, years before. He called her for help. She invited us right away to her home. She welcomed us with a warmest smile. She gave us mint tea, and then bread, and then dates. The whole family came out to greet us. That moment was a beautiful moment among unknown friends. We were Vietnamese and Catholic. They were Jordanian and Muslim. But we felt no distance between us. Everyone just mingled. Some of us wanted to offer them some money as a token of our appreciation, but they refused. They said it was their love for us. The only favor they wanted from us was to have a picture taken with us. When it was time for us to leave, the whole family came out to give us hugs, very tight hugs. They came all the way to the street where our bus was to wave us goodbye. I still have goosebumps while I am writing this story. On the way back to the hotel, the tour guide told us that if someone, a stranger, just stopped by any house of the local people and asked for a meal and a bed, the family would open their door, to welcome us and give us the best they had. If we needed to be dropped off somewhere, they would make sure to help us reach the destination. It would be a shame if they failed to show their hospitality and kindness. In short, in our experience, people there, including Palestinians, were kind and gentle.

Fourth, experiencing the Holy Land will enable us to **value more what we have** at home. Here in America, natural resources are overly abundant compared to the land of Jesus. What we take for granted is what they hunger for on a regular basis, e.g. water, electricity. The main source for fresh water in the whole region is the Sea (= lake) of Galilee. Which is under the control of Israel. The water flowing into Palestinian territories depends on the mercy of Israel. While I was there, I also watched where news that some Palestinians decided to buy gasoline so that they could use generators to produce electricity in case Israel switched off the power line. Besides,

peace seems to have been an ongoing desire of people. They greet one another with different greetings that have the word “peace”. Perhaps that desire has never been realized so it keeps being expressed in such a way, I wonder. Despite all that, Jordan and the Holy Land are evaluated to be among the safest places for tourists and pilgrims. When asked how they felt about the pilgrimage, everyone replied: “It was wonderful. I will come back when I can!”

I felt the same way. So I would like to repeat the words of Jesus “**Come and see.**” (John 1:39)

Our present church building was dedicated on June 1, 1967, by Francis Cardinal Spellman.
