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Robert Owens: A Knight to Remember:

Grove City missionary dies in Cambodia

Our Lady of Perpetual Help parishioner was drawn to help orphaned children in Cambodia

Grove City, OH—In June 2015 Bob and Kim Owens were invited to a presentation about Asia's Hope, a Columbus-based, multi-denominational, grassroots movement working in Cambodia, Thailand and India to aid orphaned children. The Owens learned about efforts to provide quality long-term care for youth at high risk of sexual and economic exploitation.

When Bob Owens realized the opportunity to travel on a mission to Cambodia, the 74 year-old said, "This is on my bucket list! I have to go work with those kids."

Thus began Bob's and Kim's odyssey as missionaries, raising funds from their parish, Our Lady of Perpetual Help in Grove City, and preparing for the international trip. Their friends' and families' generosity provided for the purchase of several bicycles for the younger children and a motor scooter for the college students to take to classes. Other money went toward a general fund for the children's needs.

"Mission outreach is central to who we are as a parish family," said Fr. Dan Millisor, pastor of Our Lady of Perpetual Help. "Our purpose is to form and send intentional missionary disciples of Jesus Christ into the world. These missionaries were sent by us to a place far away yet dear to our hearts."

Millisor also said, "Our missionary outreach is local through St. Vincent DePaul Ministries,

regional though our connection with Laurelville, and international through our missionary effort in Haiti as well as through Asia's Hope in Cambodia. These missionaries carried not only our prayers for the children of Asia's Hope, but also our financial support of the home we are working toward sponsoring."

The Owens left the United States on May 23, 2016, to enjoy a week's vacation in the resort town of Siem Reap, Cambodia, with fellow missionaries including their granddaughter, Jayla Owens, Ray and Debbie Sheridan, Travis Runnels and Melissa Holt.

Tragically, before even reaching the family-style children's home where they were to work, Bob was struck by a motorcycle and killed on May 29.

Many who found themselves in Kim's situation—widowed by an accident overseas— may have only been able to concentrate on getting home. Kim, however, graciously received the mother and sister of the man who hit Bob and answered their pleas for her forgiveness with hugs, tears, and the pardon they needed. She also welcomed a visit from several children from the Battambang 5 Children's Home.

Debbie Sheridan described the visit. "It was such an awesome experience," she said. "The director of Asia's Hope in Cambodia wanted to know if it would be OK to bring the kids. They wanted to see us and show their sorrow and share love. They understood what had happened."

"The kids had pen pal letters from another church in Grove City," Sheridan explained. "They shared those letters and wrote back while we were together. We had pizza and ice cream and it was a fun day in that week. There was such a connection between Kim and those kids."

Kim, Jayla, and the Sheridans arrived back at Port Columbus International Airport on June 5. Runnels and Holt returned on June 7. Several of Kim's co-





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workers from Our Lady of Perpetual Help, where she is a finance associate, met her at the airport.

Pastoral Minister Marti Hurd was there to greet Kim. “Kim was countercultural in Cambodia when she forgave the motorcyclist’s mother,” said Hurd. “Kim’s acts of love had long-term impact on the man’s family and on the Cambodian people. She had to give her permission for him to be treated and said that the family did not have to compensate her. She changed lives forever with her mercy.”

“It’s actually through his death that Bob continues to serve Asia’s Hope as a missionary,” Hurd said. “All the attention that Asia’s Hope is receiving is drawing people to see the needs of these children.”

Bob’s funeral was held at Our Lady of Perpetual Help on June 8. To continue the mission work that had become so important to him, gifts in his memory can be made to Asia’s Hope or to The Catholic Foundation.



In founding the Knights of Columbus, Father Michael J. McGivney sought to respond to the crisis in family life affecting Catholics in 19th-century America. As a young man he witnessed firsthand the challenges his widowed mother faced with seven children at home. Later, as a priest he confronted on a daily basis the problems affecting the families of his parish community due to poverty, violence, alcoholism, immigration, anti-Catholic prejudice and discrimination.

Father McGivney's vision for family life was not simply that each family might find financial and material aid. He understood that holiness is the calling of all baptized Christians. And, seeing as his two brothers followed him into the priesthood, we can understand how truly important the "sanctuary of the home" was to the McGivney family.



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His family was a living example of what the Second Vatican Council later taught — that each man, woman and child is called to holiness through proclaiming the Gospel and communicating the divine gift of love through the activities of their daily lives.

When Christian families respond in this way to the design of the Creator, they become a “domestic Church” that, as Pope Paul VI explained, mirrors “the various aspects of the entire Church” (*Evangelii Nuntiandi*, 71).

Since the Second Vatican Council, and especially during the pontificate of St. John Paul II, it has become clear that the family is “the way of the” In one sense, this obviously means that the family is the object of the Church’s evangelization efforts.

In other words, the “mission” of the family in the task of evangelization is to be what it is called to be — that is, to live its daily life as a Christian family, or as St. John Paul II said so often, “Families, become what you are!” (*Familiaris Consortio*, 17). This mission is at the heart of the “community of life and love” (*Catechism of the Catholic Church*, 1603). That begins with the married couple in the sacrament of matrimony.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church tells us, “Conjugal love involves a totality, in which all the elements of the person enter. . . . It aims at a deeply personal unity, a unity that, beyond union in one flesh, leads to forming one heart and soul” (*Catechism of the Catholic Church*, 1643).

In other words, sacramental marriage involves not just an agreement between the spouses but a radical transformation of the spouses.

As Pope Benedict XVI wrote in *Deus Caritas Est*, “Marriage is based on an exclusive and definitive love becomes the icon of the relationship between God and his people and vice versa. God’s way of loving becomes the measure of human love” (*Deus Caritas Est*, 11).

In this way, the witness of husband and wife within the daily life of the family can guard, reveal and

communicate love as they make their own the gifts of marriage: unity, indissolubility, faithfulness and openness to new life.

A recent Vatican document on the role and mission of the family has stated “the family needs to be rediscovered as the essential agent in the work of evangelization” (*Instrumentum Laboris*, 103) It also pointed to the necessity to better understand the “missionary dimension of the family as a domestic church” (*Instrumentum Laboris*, 48).

These observations echo those of St. John Paul II, who said in 1979 during his meeting with the Latin American bishops that “in the future, evangelization will depend largely on the domestic church” (*Pope John Paul II, Address to the Third General Conference of the Latin American Episcopate*).

Clearly, the role of the family in the work of evangelization is not primarily a matter of programs, projects or strategies. These all have their place, but they are secondary. Their place is to be at the service of what is essential: the love between a husband and wife which, sanctified through the love of Christ, radiates to each member of their family.

The family as “domestic church” encounter with Christ within the community of a particular Christian family — a place where each member of the family has an important role.

The family’s mission to “guard, reveal and communicate love” like the parish community does not exist in an ideal place. The truth and beauty of the family remains to be communicated to every Christian family, even those that are fragile, wounded or broken. These families too may read the words of St. Paul with confidence: “Who shall separate us from the love of Christ?” (Rom 8:35). And they may find in that confidence a path of hope and healing.

During his visit to the Philippines, Pope Francis cited the need for “holy and loving families to protect the beauty and truth of the family in God’s plan and to be an example for other families” (*Pope*





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Francis, Address to Families at the Mall of Asia Arena). Building the Domestic Church is one concrete way that the Knights of Columbus, in solidarity with Pope Francis, can offer “holy and loving families” for the Church’s mission of evangelization in our time.

Get to Know a Saint:

St. Luthgard



One of the outstanding mystics of the Middle Ages, a Cistercian nun, sometimes called Lutgardis. She was born in Tongres, Brabant, Belgium. When she was twelve she was placed in St. Catherine's Benedictine [Convent](#) at Saint-Trond because her dowry for marriage had been lost by her family. A vision of [Christ](#) compelled Lutgard to become a Benedictine. She had many mystical experiences, levitated, and had a [form](#) of the stigmata. In order to avoid being made an abbess, Lutgard joined the [Cistercians](#) at Aywieres. She lived a mystical [life](#) there for three decades and was famed for her spiritual [wisdom](#) and miracles. During the last eleven years of her [life](#) she was blind. She died on June 16 and is still revered as a leading mystic of the thirteenth century.


